#### 3. Oral Communications

John Daugherty announced that the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) turned 20 years old on June 6, 2010.

Mike Molesky informed members that the Santa Cruz Spinal Cord Injury Peer Support Group meets the 3<sup>rd</sup> Saturday each month at 1:00 pm at 610 Frederick Street and those interested could call Roger McKowan 457 7067 for more information. He added that the group could also be found on Facebook.

Robert White requested RTC staff to find out whether the dinner train, that may be a feature once the rail acquisition is complete, will be ADA compliant.

Lisa Berkowitz said that starting the 1<sup>st</sup> of September, Community Bridges Meals on Wheels will be providing two noon meal to seniors at the Scotts Valley Senior Center (*subsequent to the meeting CB decided to start with one day and move to two after staff and volunteers have a chance to feel settled with the new meal service*), which will serve roughly 25 to 30 seniors. Transportation will not be provided initially and the City of Scotts Valley will be providing the building and staffing costs.



Mike Molesky said that the In Home Health Services (IHHS) agency is offering a legislative training forum, including advocacy for ADA issues, the 1<sup>st</sup> Friday of each month at 1:30pm, Building K, Emeline Street, Room 206. Two senior legislators, Charles Molnar and Bud Winslow are the facilitators and the meeting is open to all. Mike suggested that Commission Chairs attend.

Karena Pushnik told members that the revised Bikeways map has been printed and is available free of charge, and she supplied copies to members. She also informed members that the Arana Gulch item will not be heard by the Coastal Commission in August and has been postponed to the October or December meeting and said she will keep members posted as to the date of that hearing. Mike Molesky said he was informed that there would be accessible transportation available for those who wanted to attend the meeting. John Daugherty mentioned that people would be able to testify via video and those interested should contact Charlie Dixon.

Karena Pushnik announced that the Commission approved the appointment of Robert White as the 5<sup>th</sup> District representative to the E&D TAC, Sharon Barbour as the Alternate for the 5<sup>th</sup> District and Sheryl Hagemann as the alternate representing Social Services/People with Disabilities.

Tom Crain requested information regarding ADA access to Mr. Toots on the Esplanade.

# 12.b Community Bridges/CTSA including 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter and 7/20 Board Reports

Catherine Patterson Valdez gave a detailed update on Community Bridges/Lift Line rides during the 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter. She noted that they will have to discontinue the rides for Dragon Slayers due to the low number of riders, the high amount of transportation time, poor road conditions, vehicle damage and funding cuts.

Catherine said that Taxi Script rides used are at 111% of their projection. She said that medical transportation is at 100% and Meals-on-Wheels is at 101%. Having exceeded funding for FY09-10 and with funding being cut for FY10-11, she indicated that Community Bridges will have to find some creative ways to fund all transportation.

She mentioned that the Watsonville City Council meeting agenda for that evening includes a request from Community Bridges/CTSA to move their maintenance, operation and intake facility from Aptos to a new location in Watsonville on Ford Street. Her office, dispatch and the IT group will remain at the Aptos location. She will provide an update at the next E&D TAC meeting.

Catherine informed members that they hope to acquire an older 8-passenger vehicle with a lift from UCSC to add to their fleet. The vehicle was originally acquired through Section 5310 program.

She also mentioned that the out-of-county transportation program for veterans funded by the federal New Freedom funds is growing and Community Bridges has been asked to extend their program to Monterey County. The funding currently available and the future scenario, make it unlikely to expand service at this time. Karena Pushnik asked about the dialysis rides that were also funded by the New Freedom grant and Catherine said that they have provided 850 dialysis ride during the months of April, May and June using New Freedom funds and that all goals are being met.

Action: The motion (Coley/Anjo) was made to accept Item 12b carries unanimously.

# 13. Receive Information/Provide Input on Bus Stop Improvement Program/Process – Metro Staff

Ciro Aguirre gave a presentation on the plan to expend \$500,000 in bus stop improvement funds, which were made available when the Metro no longer needed the funds secured for travel assistance due to Google Transit. Metro staff included bus stops/shelter locations based on input from the E&D TAC and the Pedestrian Safety Work Group about priority origins and destinations frequented by seniors and people with disabilities. Upgrades for shelters could include screening around existing shelters, re-roofing, repair to the adjacent sidewalks to prevent trip hazards, repainting of red curbing so vehicles do not park at the stops, and the installation of solar panels and beacons to alert bus drivers of riders waiting at stops or shelters in areas that are not well lit at night. In addition, the improvement proposal includes reductions in the length of benches

within several shelters in order to adhere to the ADA requirement of 60 inches of maneuverable space to accommodate wheelchairs. Some of the areas without shelters will have benches or drop-down seating installed and some will only be painted with red curbing. With a funding budget of \$500,000 available to complete all upgrades and repairs Ciro said that Metro is limited to what repairs/upgrades can be made, and wants to make improvements in a geographically equitable manner. Ciro also explained that it would cost \$100,000 to \$250,000 to install a brand new shelter at a single location as they would be required to meet Caltrans' "new construction" requirements which include full ADA specifications and include a bus pad, landing, shelter, concrete, utility relocation and potentially purchase right-of-way. In addition, Ciro noted that the City of Watsonville has adopted the Caltrans standard for new construction so any improvements in Watsonville need to comply with the full set of construction standards, thereby pushing up costs for those bus stop improvements and reducing the total number possible.

The committee expressed appreciation to Metro for considering the needs of seniors and people with disabilities when prioritizing bus stop improvements. Concerns were expressed by the committee regarding the potential impacts to seniors of the proposal to make stops ADA compliant by reducing bench space. Suggestions included expending the funding to add benches to locations where they don't yet exist, to extend the paved landing area to accommodate wheelchairs, to extend the roof of the shelters to create more protected space for wheelchairs on the other side of the support post, and/or to replace the bench seats lost with fold down seating. Members also requested that when more funding is available, the priority list for improvements to the bus stop include following locations: the stop(s) used by people leaving Watsonville Hospital; and the outbound stop on Capitola Road at Jose Avenue that serves the Santa Cruz Health Center, public housing and the park. Attendees also wondered whether exemptions were possible to the Caltrans Standards in the City of Watsonville in order to avoid a full bus stop makeover and enable Metro to make a greater quantity of less costly improvements.

Karena Pushnik requested that Metro supply the E&D TAC with a list of all stops and the proposed improvements before the next meeting. She also requested that any observations by Metro staff doing field work about the condition of adjacent pedestrian facilities to bus stops be forward to the Pedestrian Safety Work Group (via email to Karena), since access to the stops will help remove barriers to use.

# 14. Receive Status Report about Mobility Outreach and Education and Agricultural Worker Transportation Programs – Community Bridges staff

Catherine Patterson Valdez presented her report about Community Bridges' Mobility Outreach and Education and Agricultural Worker Transportation Programs. She said that there was interest in a Mobility Center to consolidate and disseminate transportation information and possible locations for the center were discussed. Catherine said that this project is still eligible for federal Section 5317 capitol funding; however there is neither staff nor matching funding available for her to pursue this project at this time. She said that they will revisit this in the future and keep it on the unmet needs list.

Catherine visited farm day laborers who voiced concerns about feeder buses. Even though laborers could travel from their homes to the feeder buses that would then take them to work sites, they were worried that workers coming in from Greenfield and Kings County to Santa Cruz County to work could cause them to lose their jobs to out of area workers. The Association for Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) will be the lead to bring Agricultural Worker vans to this area, if feasible.

John Daugherty suggested that due to the remaining items on the agenda that the meeting time be extended.



Action: The motion (Berkowitz/Shevlin) to extend the meeting to 4:00 pm.

# 15. Receive Update about 2-1-1 System - E&D TAC Representative

Catherine Patterson Valdez is the E&D TAC representative to the United Way's 2-1-1 Steering committee. She gave a brief presentation regarding her attendance at a kick-off meeting for the committee. The goal of this committee is to identify resources throughout the county so that when calls come into the 2-1-1 center, accurate information is provided to the caller to assist with any issue they might have.

Karena Pushnik told members that 2-1-1 is operational and has started providing one-on-one call-in service with operators based in San Francisco. The transportation database used by the center was supplied in the packet and appears to be missing many of the key specialized transportation providers. Karena said that the RTC is in process of updating the *Guide to Specialized Transportation for Seniors and People with Disabilities* and suggested that once the new version is available that it be provided to 2-1-1 as an additional resource for specific transportation questions.

Catherine told members that 2-1-1 still needs volunteers to help staff in emergencies and that they could call Robert Hallbaur at 227-8544 for training and instructions.

Lisa Berkowitz suggested that members test the system by calling and asking a question of the center to see if accurate information is supplied by the operators.

# 16. Brainstorm Strategies to Publicize Bus and ParaCruz service to the County Fair held September 14-19 – E&D TAC Chair

Maria Boyce from Metro said that there would be transportation to the Santa Cruz County Fair available for 3 days from the Watsonville Metro Station on the 14<sup>th</sup>, 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> of September. She noted that the route will be an extension of the 79 with the same stops, but would have a specific sign stating "Fair" or something similar. Ciro mentioned that ParaCruz will also be running during those days complementary to the fixed route service. Maria said that notification about service to the County Fair would be available via flyers and on the Metro website. Members suggested that notification could be made through the media, to schools and senior centers and through mass email. Karena suggested that the information come to her so that she could send it out to other groups and committees for them to share as well.

# RTC Meeting Highlights

August 5, 2010 Meeting Highlights

**Branch Line purchase California Transportation Commission (CTC) conditions approved:** The RTC approved a resolution to address the CTC conditions attached to the approval for funding to acquire the Santa Cruz Branch Rail Line. The conditions include initiating recreational rail service, continuing freight service as long as it is required by the Surface Transportation Board and to reimburse the state if the Branch Line is no longer used for the original purpose approved by the CTC.

**Updated bikeways map released:** The RTC released an updated bikeways map showing bicycle lanes, paths and alternate routes within Santa Cruz County, including off-road trails. The map features detailed insets of the San Lorenzo Valley, Scotts Valley, Watsonville, and Santa Cruz to La Selva Beach areas as well as other major attractions.

**Funding Claim for Santa Cruz Metro approved:** The RTC approved a funding claim from the Santa Cruz Metropolitan Transit District for \$2,801,550 in State Transit Assistance funds. State Transit Assistance funds were diverted to other areas of the state budget due to the State's budget crisis. The funds may be used for transit capital or operating expenses.

Highway 1 Projects progress report received: The RTC is making progress toward construction of the Highway 1 Soquel/Morrissey Auxiliary Lanes project. 65% design level plans were submitted to Caltrans, permit applications to state and federal resource agencies were submitted, and a Highway Aesthetics Community Advisory meeting was held. The RTC continues to develop the Sustainable Transportation and Access Rating System (STARS) credits and will determine how they might apply to the Hwy 1 HOV Lanes project.

# September 2, 2010 Meeting

**Report on proposed 511 Traveler Information System received:** The RTC received a report on a request for public comments on proposed components of a 511 Traveler Information System for the Monterey Bay Area that would provide travelers with real-time traffic and travel information. Input from local residents and travelers to Santa Cruz and Monterey Counties will help tailor the program to fit the needs of the local community. A video and survey to provide input are available at <a href="https://www.511montereybay.org">www.511montereybay.org</a>.

California Transportation Foundation's Person of the Year honored: The RTC recognized Gary Richards, reporter at the San Jose Mercury News and also known as "Mr. Roadshow," for being awarded the California Transportation Foundation's Person of the Year. The RTC, along with the Transportation Agency for Monterey County, nominated Mr. Richards to pay tribute to the valuable public service provided by his columns which cover a wide range of traffic related topics, provide an understanding of complex traffic related issues, and answer a fraction of the approximately 1,000 comments he receives each week.

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# **Property Owners Share Responsibility for Sidewalk Conditions**

This week, the Street Smarts Blog will feature articles written by guest bloggers from local transportation-related agencies and organizations. Topics include safety information about sidewalks and pedestrian issues from the Santa Cruz County Regional Transportations Commission, "Sharrows" and cycling issues from Ecology Action and child passenger programs by the Community Traffic Safety Coalition. Today's blog is from Karena Pushnik, a Senior Transportation Planner for the Santa Cruz County Regional Transportation Commission. She serves as the agency's Public Information Coordinator and is staff to the RTC's Elderly and Disabled Advisory Committee and its subcommittee, the Pedestrian Safety Work Group.

Every one of us is a "pedestrian" because we use the network of public and private walkways for some portion of the trip between our homes and our destinations.

For the past year and a half, five individuals representing people of various ages and abilities called the Pedestrian Safety Work Group have been working diligently on their mission "to ensure safe and accessible pedestrian travel and access throughout the county for the benefit of all residents." This dynamic group has been able to secure an Environmental Justice grant from Caltrans and a New Freedom grant from the federal government to not only identify, but also to make improvements to the local pedestrian network. However, in assessing the problems with the pedestrian network, they realized that the condition of the existing facilities was just as important as the missing facilities such as sidewalks, curb cuts and crosswalks. In addition, California state law requires that the adjacent property owner is responsible for maintenance of the sidewalk, a fact not commonly known or understood.

The Pedestrian Safety Work Group researched the roles and responsibilities for sidewalk maintenance in all five jurisdictions in Santa Cruz County and documented their findings in a report titled, "Improving the Safety and Accessibility of Sidewalks in Santa Cruz County: A study of Jurisdiction and Property Owner Responsibilities and Practices."

The report helps us all understand why common standards of maintenance would help avoid confusion, why an inventory of the current condition of all facilities is important, who is responsible for maintenance and to what extent, how individuals can report unsafe conditions, why a community value of 'safe and accessible sidewalks' is universally beneficial, and what programs are in place to help property owners make required repairs. In addition, the report/appendices include information about innovative processes employed in other areas.

# **BACKGROUND:**

The Mobility Options Program, launched by VTA in 2009, provides a valuable and much desired service to persons with disabilities as well as to the senior community. VTA has promoted this program to stakeholder groups, specifically reaching out to the visually impaired community to ensure that the Vista Center is provided referrals per our travel training contract. Unfortuntately, weather conditions over the past few months have impacted our training schedule. As the weather continues to improve we anticipate an increase in interest in the Daycation program, as well as more referrals for travel training generally.

# **DISCUSSION:**

#### **Travel Training**

VTA, through our vendors Paratransit Inc. and the Vista Center, provides travel training for individuals with disabilities. We have contacted a variety of agencies that assist people with visual disabilities, including the California School for the Blind, Low Visions Services, and the Santa Clara Valley Blind Center. Our increased promotion to agencies that assist people with visual impairments has resulted in a number of leads, interest from the agencies, and a few qualified referrals.

Some statistics since program inception include the following:

- Successfully completed travel training sessions: 24
- Referrals Generated: 49

- Referrals generated: 12

- VTA continues to receive extensive lists of potential participants from Outreach on a monthly basis. VTA calls each person on the list to help generate additional referrals.

- Survey Results: VTA does not currently have a relevant survey sample for reporting. At this time, we have only six pre-training surveys and the corresponding one-month post training survey. The three-month post training survey for the six individuals will be taken in May. We continue to collect survey data and will be able to report meaningful data at the next CTA meeting.

# **Daycation**

The Daycation program continues to gain momentum, and we anticipate more interest as the weather improves. Since my previous update we have enjoyed the following successes:

- All participants must be able to use VTA bus and light rail service, including being able to travel to/from bus stops, board bus/light rail, use fare box, etc.
- Participants must provide their name, address and/or email for a follow up survey

# Santa Cruz Center:

We have finished the year above goal in both the number of rides provided and the number of clients we served, despite cuts in funding. This is due in part to the increase in volunteers to the program. We now have an excellent pool of drivers serving our clients. Only three rides this quarter were unfilled due to lack of a driver being available.

Funding is a challenge for the upcoming year. Our contract has been reduced from \$66,276 to \$51,754, a decrease of \$14,522. We have reduced our goals for next year but will need to look for ways to reduce the program costs as well as look for some alternative funding. Some of the lose could be recouped if the County tax revenue base increases in 2010-2011.





# **ACTION REQUESTED AT THE AUGUST 13, 2010 BOARD MEETING**

### I. RECOMMENDED ACTION

That the Board of Directors authorize the General Manager to execute contract amendments with Creative Bus Sales, Inc. to add Synergy seat covers and a TDSS under seat tie down retractor system to the contract for the purchase of twenty-two (22) each raised-top paratransit vans and a Fire Trace automatic fire suppression system to the contracts for the purchase of twenty-two (22) each raised-top paratransit vans and for five (5) each low-floor paratransit mini-vans for a total additional amount not to exceed \$122,540.

### II. SUMMARY OF ISSUES

- On April 4, 2010, Santa Cruz METRO entered into a contract with Creative Bus Sales, Inc. for the purchase of twenty-two raised-top paratransit vans for a total amount not to exceed \$1,135,000.
- On June 1, 2010, Santa Cruz METRO entered into a contract with Creative Bus Sales, Inc. for the purchase of five each low-floor paratransit mini-vans for a total amount not to exceed \$231,077.
- Staff requests the addition of Synergy seat covers and a TDSS (tie down storage system) under seat tie down retractor system to the contract for the twenty-two raised top paratransit vans.
- Staff requests the addition of a Fire Trace automatic fire suppression system for all twenty-seven paratransit vans to be installed at the factory during the vehicle manufacture.

#### III. DISCUSSION

On April 4, 2010, Santa Cruz METRO entered into a contract with Creative Bus Sales, Inc. for the purchase of twenty-two raised-top paratransit vans for a total amount not to exceed \$1,135,000. On June 1, 2010, Santa Cruz METRO entered into a contract with Creative Bus Sales, Inc. for the purchase of five each low-floor paratransit mini-vans for a total amount not to exceed \$231,077.

Staff requests the addition of Synergy seat covers and a TDSS (tie down storage system) under seat tie down retractor system to the contract for the twenty-two raised top paratransit vans. The seat covers allow for increased comfort for the riders and easier cleaning in the event of a bio hazard occurrence. The TDSS retractor system supplies storage area for the Q'straint wheel chair securement system when it is not in use. The additional cost for the Synergy seat covers option is \$560.00 plus tax per vehicle. The additional cost for the TDSS system is \$360 plus tax per vehicle.

Staff requests the addition of a fire suppression system for all twenty-seven paratransit vans to be installed at the factory during the vehicle manufacture. This added safety feature will extinguish a vehicle engine fire and allow the driver additional time to safely extract passengers from the van in an emergency situation. The additional cost for the fire suppression system is \$3,717.58 per vehicle including tax.

Staff is recommending that the Board of Directors authorize the General Manager to execute contract amendments with Creative Bus Sales, Inc. to add Synergy seat covers and a TDSS under seat tie down retractor system to the contract for the purchase of twenty-two (22) each raised-top paratransit vans and a Fire Trace automatic fire suppression system to both contracts for the purchase of twenty-two (22) each raised-top paratransit vans and for five (5) each low-floor paratransit mini-vans for an additional total amount not to exceed \$122,540.

#### IV. FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Funds to support the contract amendments are included in the FY11 Final Capital Budget under Grant Funded Projects (ARRA funding).

# **RECOMMENDATION**

Staff recommends that the Elderly & Disabled Transportation Advisory Committee:

 Recommend that the Regional Transportation Commission approve by resolution the City of Santa Cruz's Article 8 Transportation Development Act Allocation Claim for \$50,000 to construct the Laurel Street Pedestrian Crossing; and

2. Recommend that the Regional Transportation Commission approve by resolution the City of Santa Cruz's Article 8
Transportation Development Act claim for \$50,000 to construct the Mission Street Extension Bicycle-Pedestrian Path

### **BACKGROUND**

Each year the Regional Transportation Commission allocates Article 8 Transportation Development Account (TDA) funds to local jurisdictions for bikeway and pedestrian projects. TDA funds allocated to a local jurisdiction may be rolled over from one fiscal year to the next. TDA claims with pedestrian amenities must be reviewed by the Elderly & Disabled Transportation Advisory Committee prior to approval by the Regional Transportation Commission.

# **DISCUSSION**

The City of Santa Cruz is requesting a recommendation of approval from the E&D TAC for two projects which include pedestrian amenities; \$50,000 for the Laurel Street Crossing to create two pedestrian refuge median islands and \$50,000 to replace the concrete barriers on Mission Street Extension with plastic delineators. Detailed TDA claims for both of these projects are attached (Attachment 1).

Please accept this letter as a FY 2009-10 TDA Article 8 allocation request for the following projects:

- 1. Bikeway Striping and Minor Improvements (\$10,000): This project provides for the annual re-striping of the City's 30 miles of bikeways, maintenance of bikeways and minor bikeway improvements. This project is entirely supported with TDA funds.
- 2. Bicycle Parking Program (\$1,000): This program provides for the development of bicycle parking facilities at high use areas in the public right of way.
- 3. Laurel Street Pedestrian Crossing (\$50,000): This project provides for the construction of two pedestrian refuge median islands and ramps with left-turn lanes on Laurel Street at Felix and Blackburn Streets. The proposed improvement was developed through a public process following a pedestrian fatality.
- 4. Mission Street Extension Bike-Pedestrian Path Revision (\$50,000): The City has received numerous public complaints about the K-rail used to delineate the bike-pedestrian path on this one-way street. The K-rail will be replaced with plastic delineators similar to those used on the one-way section of High Street. Some pavement repair will also be done.

Please return the balance of \$30,000 for the Shared Roadway Markings project to the City's unallocated balance as the shared road markings are being installed with other grant funded projects and the annual TDA funded Bicycle Striping and Minor Improvements project. The City's remaining unallocated balance will be used to match existing grant applications, under funded projects, and future bikeway striping and parking projects.

As with all City claims, the City will commit to maintain any facilities provided with these funds for 20 years and will prepare all necessary environmental review for these projects. All of the projects above are consistent with the City Bicycle Transportation and Pedestrian Plans and the RTP.

# **DISCUSSION**

There are several initiatives on the November 4, 2010 state ballot that could impact transportation projects and programs.

# **Proposition 22**

Due to the State's fiscal instability, there has been consistent uncertainty surrounding transportation revenue streams. Budget proposals considered and acted upon in recent years have ranged from borrowing, raiding, or outright taking of local Highway User Tax Account (HUTA), Proposition 42, and public transit funds. Additionally, agencies lost significant constitutional protection previously guaranteed by Proposition 42 after the transportation gas tax swap became effective on July 1, 2010.

At its March 4, 2010 meeting, the Regional Transportation Commission (RTC) took a position of support for the Local Tax Payer, Public Safety and Transportation Protection Act – Proposition 22. Proposition 22 seeks to restrict the state's ability to borrow, loan, and divert revenues that are dedicated to funding transportation improvement projects and services. Proposition 22 would protect and increase state transit funding; protect state and local HUTA funds; and provide more certainty for STIP and Local Streets and Roads projects, as were previously provided under Proposition 42.

However, there are some concerns about how Proposition 22 will be interpreted and implemented. Since Proposition 22 was written before the gas tax swap, it is not entirely clear what the impact of Proposition 22 will be on transportation funding from the swap. The swap eliminated the state sales tax on gasoline for transportation and Proposition 22 does not require the legislature to reinstate it. Under Proposition 22 the new 17.3-cent gas tax increase would not go away, however debt service payments on highway bonds would no longer be paid from revenues dedicated to that purpose through the gas tax swap. Instead debt service would need to come out of the state General Fund. Caltrans has indicated that it could reduce revenues available for the State Highway Operation and Protection Program (SHOPP), because truck weight fees could potentially be used to repay bond debt service. Some local jurisdictions in the state are also concerned about the impact that the increased General Fund obligations to pay debt service could have on other non-transportation General Fund programs.

# **Proposition 26**

Proposition 26 would broaden the definition of taxes to include many payments currently considered to be fees or charges. As a result, more State and local proposals to increase revenues would require approval by two-thirds of each house of the Legislature or by local voters. Any State

law adopted between January 1, 2010 and November 2, 2010 that conflicts with Proposition 26 would be repealed one year after this proposition is approved. This repeal would not take place, however, if two-thirds of each house of the Legislature passed the law again. For this reason, Proposition 26 could also impact the gas tax swap, which raised the excise tax by 17.3-cents, in place of the sales tax of gasoline.

Since the Legislature approved the gas tax swap on March 4, 2010 with only a majority vote in each house, the 17.3-cent excise tax would be repealed in November 2011 unless the Legislature approved the tax again with a two-thirds vote in each house. At that point the state excise tax would go back down to 18-cent and some believe the Proposition 42 sales tax on gasoline would be reinstated.

# **Proposition 23**

The November bailot measure Proposition 23 would suspend AB 32, California's global warming law which requires California to cut greenhouse gas emissions to 1990 levels by 2020, until unemployment falls below 5.5 percent for a year. The state's unemployment rate is now 12.4 percent. The proposed 5.5% unemployment rate criterion is an unlikely scenario for at least several years and one which has occurred only three times in California in the past 40 years. Depending on interpretation of the measure, it could also suspend some of the state's other environmental standards. In July, the non-partisan Legislative Analyst's Office issued an analysis of Proposition 23 in which it said the state's 33 percent renewable electricity standard and "low carbon fuel" regulations would be suspended if the measure passes. Rules to reduce smog from ships and a 2002 state law that requires automakers to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 30 percent on new cars by 2016 could also be suspended with passage of Proposition 23.

Supporters of Proposition 23 acknowledge that the measure would suspend several state regulations beyond AB 32, including the "cap-and-trade" plan proposed by the California Air Resources Board (CARB), which requires oil refineries, cement kilns, power plants, and other large sources of greenhouse gases to limit their emissions.

To comply with AB 32, CARB developed a document known as the "Scoping Plan," which contains 69 measures, some of which have been passed as separate laws. The Legislative Analyst's Office contends that state regulations passed under the authority of AB 32 would be suspended, but separate laws would not, such as SB375 which requires regions to develop and implement plans linking transportation and land use.

# **Other Propositions**

Proposition 21 would establish an \$18 per vehicle registration fee to help fund State Parks and Wildlife Programs. Some of these funds could be used for bicycle and pedestrian facilities within parks. Passage of this fee increase could potentially make it more difficult to receive voter approval of fee increases for transportation programs in the future.

Proposition 25 would reduce the vote threshold for passage of the state budget from two-thirds to a simple majority. It would also prohibit legislators from receiving salary or travel reimbursements if a budget is not passed on to the Governor by June 15. If this measure is approved by voters, it would go into effect immediately and could impact the FY10/11 state budget.

# **BACKGROUND**

Performance audits are required by state law every three years for local transportation planning agencies and transit operators who receive Transportation Development Act funds. In the past the Regional Transportation Commission and the Santa Cruz Metropolitan Transit District have been audited. Although not required, the 2010 Triennial Performance Audit includes Community Bridges and the Volunteer Center for the first time as recommended by the 2007 Triennial Performance Audit Report.

# **DISCUSSION**

Attached is a staff report for the October 7, 2010 RTC meeting summarizing the results of the audit for the RTC, Community Bridges, Volunteer Center and the METRO. ### RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff recommends that the Regional Transportation Commission (RTC):

- 1. Accept the FY 2006-07 to 2008-09 Triennial Performance Audit reports of the RTC and the Santa Cruz County transit operators (Attachments 1 & 2 enclosed separately);
- 2. Direct staff to work with the Budget and Administration/Personnel (B&A/P) Committee to develop responses to the recommendations in the RTC Triennial Performance Audit; and
- 3. Request that the Santa Cruz Metropolitan Transit District (Santa Cruz Metro), Community Bridges and the Volunteer Center provide responses to the recommendations in the Triennial Performance Audit of the Santa Cruz County transit operators.

# **BACKGROUND**

State law requires triennial performance audits of local transportation planning agencies and transit operators who receive Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds. The audit determines compliance with state requirements and evaluates the efficiency, effectiveness and economy of operations. The Performance Audit Guidebook produced by Caltrans states:

"While meeting the legal requirements for conducting a performance audit is important, a performance audit also provides an opportunity for an independent, objective and comprehensive review of the economy, efficiency, and effectiveness of the entity being audited. The audit has other benefits, including:

- Provides management with useful information to assess past activities and provides insight for future planning efforts;
- Provides management with a review and evaluation of an agency's organization and operations;

- Presents an opportunity to utilize auditor expertise which can supplement staff work; and
- Assures public accountability for the use of public funds."

The 2010 performance audits of the RTC and the transit operators were conducted by LSC Transportation Consultants, Inc. in accordance with Section 99246 of California's Public Utilities Code (PUC) and covered fiscal years 2007, 2008 and 2009. The audit reports have already been submitted to the State Controller as required by state law.

### DISCUSSION

To conduct the 2010 Triennial Performance Audit and prepare the audit reports, Geoff Straw of LSC Transportation Consultants interviewed board members and staff, and visited facilities of the entities being audited. Although not required by state law, the Triennial Performance Audit of the Santa Cruz County Transit Operators includes Community Bridges and the Volunteer Center for the first time as recommended in the 2007 Triennial Performance Audit report.

#### **RTC 2010 Trienial Performance Audit**

The RTC 2010 Triennial Performance Audit (Attachment 1) finds that the RTC is in compliance with all TDA requirements and in some cases exceeds those requirements. The RTC 2010 Triennial Performance Audit also finds that the five recommendations of the 2007 audit have either been implemented or their implementation is in progress. The RTC 2010 Triennial Performance Audit includes the following three recommendations:

- 1. The RTC should work closely with Santa Cruz METRO, Community Bridges, and the Volunteer Center to develop a Short Range Transit Plan (SRTP) update, including the following plan elements:
  - Financially sustainable public transportation service levels;
  - Vehicle replacement needs for each agency; and
  - Development of countywide performance goals, objectives, and measurable standards.

The RTC's involvement in the SRTP effort could include coordination, technical assistance, and partial funding.

- 2. The RTC should require that the sub-recipients of TDA Article 8 funds report the pertinent performance measures identified in PUC Section 99246(d) at least annually to the City of Santa Cruz and to the RTC. Those performance measures should be evaluated in future triennial performance audits.
- 3. The RTC should continue to work with the Association of Monterey Bay Area Governments (AMBAG) to align and refine to the extent possible planning

objectives, schedules and milestones for the region, and to continue to improve communications between the two agencies.

As in the past, RTC staff will work with the Budget and Administration/Personnel (B&A/P) Committee to develop responses to the triennial performance audit recommendations. Those responses will then be brought to the RTC for consideration.

# 2010 Triennial Performance Audit of Transit Operators

The 2010 Treinnial Performance Audit of Santa Cruz County Transit Operators finds that the operators are in compliance with all TDA requirements. The 2010 audit also finds that the three recommendations of the 2007 Triennial Performance Audit have either been implemented or their implementation is in progress. The 2010 Triennial Performance Audit of Transit Operators includes the following six recommendations:

- 1. Santa Cruz METRO should continue to work closely with SCCRTC and AMBAG to secure state and federal funding to replace its aging fleet as soon as feasible.
- 2. Santa Cruz METRO should work closely with SCCRTC, Community Bridges and the Volunteer Center to develop an SRTP update, including the following plan elements:
  - Financially sustainable public transportation service levels;
  - Vehicle replacement needs for the Santa Cruz METRO and Community Bridges; and
  - Development of comprehensive performance goals, objectives and measurable standards.
- 3. The current and future agreements that permit the pass-through of TDA Article 8 funds from the City of Santa Cruz to Community Bridges and the Volunteer Center should be amended to include the pertinent performance measures identified in PUC Section 99246(d) be reported at least annually to the City and to SCCRTC.
- 4. Santa Cruz METRO should consider developing a succession plan for its general manager and other possible departures of senior staff.
- 5. Santa Cruz METRO should continue to work with staff from the SCCRTC and the AMBAG to better align and streamline planning procedures to avoid possible delays in project delivery on future federally funded transit projects.
- 6. Community Bridges and the Volunteer Center should work with their respective annual fiscal and compliance auditors to evaluate the transportation related measures identified under the TDA, including annual operating costs and revenues.

Geoff Straw of LSC Transportation Consultants will be at the RTC's October 7, 2010 meeting to present the 2010 Triennial Performance Audit of the RTC and key points of the 2010 Triennial Performance Audit of the transit operators. Mr. Straw will also address questions or comments expressed at the meeting.

Staff recommends that the RTC accept the 2010 triennial performance audits produced by LSC Transportation Consultants, direct staff to work with the B&A/P Committee to respond to the RTC audit recommendations and request that the Santa Cruz Metro, Community Bridges and the Volunteer Center respond to the transit operators audit recommendations.

# **SUMMARY**

The required 2010 triennial performance audits for fiscal years 2007, 2008 and 2009 have been completed. The audits include findings of compliance and recommendations. Staff recommends that the RTC accept the audits, direct staff to work with the B&A/P Committee to respond to the audit and request that Santa Cruz Metro, Community Brides and the Volunteer Center provide a response to the audit recommendations.

# **DISCUSSION**

The state has developed a draft Strategic Implementation Plan (SIP) to document strategies and recommendations resulting from the Mobility Action Plan, completed in 2005. Development of the SIP was guided by local, regional, state and federal stakeholders to identify human services transportation coordination barriers and gaps, and corresponding strategies to address how transportation funding programs could be coordinated.
